The Sharp End of Pain Control

16-17 March 2010

Speakers include

Dr Joan Hester, Consultant in Pain Medicine, King's College Hospital; Immediate Past President, British Pain Society

Appointed Consultant in Anaesthesia and Pain Management in Eastbourne in 1976, where she instigated multi-disciplinary pain services, and was co-founder and medical adviser to St Wilfrid's Hospice in the 1980s. Became Medical Director of Eastbourne Hospitals from 1999-2002, and Lead Clinician of Pain Services in E Sussex. Appointed Consultant in Pain Medicine at King's College Hospital in 2004 and awarded a MSc in palliative care from King's College, London.

Dr Sue Peat, *Consultant in Pain Medicine, King's College Hospital* Sue Peat trained in medicine at St Bartholomew's (London), and after qualifying (1982) undertook higher specialist training in Anaesthesia at King's College. She later developed an interest in pain control, and in particular morphine metabolism.

Dr Nigel Sykes, *Medical Director, St Christopher's Hospice; Hon. Senior Lecturer in Palliative Medicine, King's College London* Read medicine at Oxford. He is an Honorary Senior Lecturer in Palliative Medicine at King's College, London. His main research interests are in the management of gastrointestinal symptoms in terminally ill patients. He has written widely on aspects of symptom control. Has served as a member of the Association of Palliative Medicine's Executive and Ethics committees. Spoken on television and radio and presented to British parliamentary committees on ethical issues relating to palliative care. This two-day course will offer participants an up to date insight into the role of specialist pain management in the palliative care population, including those cared for in a hospital, hospice or home environment. It will define the place of interventional procedures and new drugs appropriate to this group of patients.

Teaching will include practical advice about neural blockade techniques including epidural and intrathecal catheters and cordotomy.

The programme will also include sessions on:

- Opioid Toxicity
- Pharmacokinetics of Neuraxial Drugs
- Neuropathic Pain
- Other interventional pain techniques
